


Story Time Kit




A Puppet Show


Geography and Art

Put on a paper doll puppet show! Before you color your dolls, decide what story you want to tell. Maybe it's your favorite book or a movie you just watched. Design your dolls accordingly. Tape them to popsicle sticks, spoons, straws, or whatever you have in your house.


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
MAKE YOUR OWN PAPER CHAIN OF DOLLS

You need:

- Paper doll template (see next page)
- Sheets of construction paper (12" x 18") in any color you'd like
- Scissors
- Anything you love to draw with: crayons, pens, pencils, chalk, paint
- Fun things to add details: scraps of patterned paper, old magazines, fabric, envelopes, stamps
- Glue
- Tape

- 1. Fold one sheet of paper in half lengthwise and cut along the fold. You'll have two strips of paper measuring 6" x 18".
- 2. Fold one strip of paper in half. Then fold each layer in half again like an accordion.
- 3. Tear out the doll template page from the back of the book. Cut around the doll shapes.
- 4. Place a doll template on your folded paper and trace around it on the top layer. Make sure the arms extend past the folds.
- 5. Use scissors to snip around the template, cutting through all the layers. Make sure you don't cut across the arms so the dolls are holding hands when you unfold the chain.
- 6. Unfold and let your dolls dance. Now doodle on each doll however you'd like! You can make each doll different, or the same.
